

# **Day Habilitation**

For several years OU has worked on creating a Day Habilitation (Day Hab) program catered to helping persons served develop social skills through community engagement and activities. We are pleased to announce this dream has finally become a reality! In January of 2018, OU launched its newest waiver program spearheaded by our Employment Services Department. The program's intended goal is to provide wrap around services to individuals receiving community employment through OU's Employment Services program. We want to ensure these individuals have a chance to work on meaningful goals, socialize with their peers, and stay active in our community while maintaining their employment.

At the beginning of each month, Day Hab staff and persons served come together to plan group activities both meaningful and purposeful to each participating individual. This collaboration ensures the individual's interest is identified and met throughout the



Since the program's debut, services have doubled from twice a week to four days a week. In addition, the number of persons served receiving Day Hab services increased from four individuals to seventeen individuals. We are excited to see the Day Hab program grow and watch our OU Team continuously looking for new and innovative ways to keep persons served engaged in the Siouxland Community.
